IOC

The **IOC Executive Board (EB)** met 28-29 November in Kuwait City. Key highlights:- the inclusion, pending the agreement of VANOC, of the event of Ski Cross into the programme of the Olympic Winter Games in 2010 in Vancouver; confirmation of the on-going support of the IOC to Iraqi athletes; reports on future Olympic Games.

BOCOG was the only Organising Committee to present to the EB in Kuwait. The success of the first test events and recent meetings with broadcasters and international press was specifically noted as well as the great progress being made on venue construction. More than 26 test events are scheduled in 2007. BOCOG announced that it had released the ticket prices for the Games, priced so as to ensure local spectators have the chance to see the Games first hand. With 58% of all tickets for sale priced at or lower than RMB 100 and about 14% of tickets reserved for Chinese students, large Chinese crowds are likely to join the international spectators to enjoy this, the first Games in their country. BOCOG also presented concrete measures being undertaken by the authorities that will help improve air quality.

The IOC EB agreed the recommendations of the Olympic Programme Commission on the improvement of the Programme review process

- EB to make recommendations to the Session in terms of the composition of the Olympic Programme
- EB to propose to the Session a list of 25 sports to be voted as a block, except for the 2016 review where 26 sports would be proposed.
- EB to propose to the Session a list of selected recognized sports to be considered for possible inclusion

- Modify the Olympic Charter to establish that a simple majority of votes decides on the inclusion of new sports to the Programme

- Schedule the review of the Olympic Programme so that it can be finalised seven years prior to the Olympic Games (which is already the case)

On the Olympic Programme:

- Increase the minimum number of sports in each edition of the Games from 15 to 25 and modify the Olympic Charter accordingly
- Keep maximum number of athletes at 10,500
- Keep maximum number of sports at 28
- Allow flexibility regarding the number of events, disciplines and teams.

The **IOC Finance Commission** met in Lausanne the beginning of the month. A minute's silence was observed in honour of the former Chairman of this Commission, Marc Hodler, who died recently.

* NOCs

The city of Medellín (Colombia) will host the 9th South American Games in 2010. This decision was taken on 7 November at the **General Assembly of the South American Sports Organisation (ODESUR)**, which took place in Buenos Aires (Argentina), the host city of the 2006 edition of these Games. During the ODESUR Assembly, several presentations were made by the candidate cities that are bidding to host the Winter Olympic Games 2014 and a progress report on the organization of the Pan American Games RIO 2007 was also presented by the General Secretary of Rio 2007 Organizing Committee, Carlos Roberto Osório.

Within the framework of a ceremony held at the Elysée Palace in Paris on 3 November, **ANOC President Mario Vázquez Raña** was awarded by

the President of the French Republic Jacques Chirac with the insignia of Officer in the Legion of Honour "for the quality of his immense services rendered to world Olympism".

* World Olympians Association

The World Olympians Association held its last Executive Board meeting of this year in Monaco, 10-11 November, organised by WOA Treasurer and UIPM Secretary General **Joël Bouzou**. IOC Sports Director Kelly Fairweather was present on the first day and helped with useful advice and ideas. The reports of the President Pal Schmitt, those of the Treasurer and of the WOA regional offices were heard. Discussion items included WADA, IOC Athletes' Commission and 5th Cultural Forum in Beijing. Joël Bouzou talked about a new project "Sport and Peace", which he will develop in Monaco in his new capacity as Advisor to HSH Prince Albert II. He proposed to give a key role to the Olympians in the project. The future of the WOA – Osaka Partnership was examined. It was decided that the WOA will pursue a close partnership with the International Olympic Committee. Next year's budget and schedule was discussed and decided upon. As part of a restructuring of the WOA, the Executive Board made a unanimous decision to terminate the position of Regional Director of the WOA Office of the Americas and to close the Miami office. The Office of the Americas will be reopened soon at a more appropriate location.



International Sport

* WADA

On 20 November, the Foundation Board of the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) unanimously elected Jean-François Lamour, French Minister for Youth, Sport and the Voluntary Sector, to the position of Vice-Chairman of the Agency for 2007. Jean-François Lamour, whose one-year term of office begins in January 2007, succeeds Danish Sports Minister Brian Mikkelsen, who is ending his second consecutive one-year term of office. Furthermore, for WADA's Executive Committee for 2007, Denmark replaces France as the European representative, while New Zealand will succeed Australia as the representative of Oceania

* GAISF

Ching-Kuo Wu was elected President of the International Boxing Federation (AIBA) at its Congress in Santo Domingo (Dominican Republic).

* IOC Sport for All Congress in Havana, Cuba

UIPM President **Klaus Schormann**, Secretary General **Joël Bouzou** and Vice President **Ivar Sisniega** were present in Havana on behalf of UIPM

for the World Sport for All Congress, 31 October – 3 November.

The 11th World Sport for All Congress was opened in the presence of IOC President Jacques Rogge, First Vice President of the Cuban Council of State Raúl Castro, Cuban NOC and Modern Pentathlon Federation President José Fernandez Alvarez and some 300 leaders in the field of health, sport and science. Over two-and-a-half days, discussions focused on the benefits and challenges of physical activity – from promoting the merits of sport and exercise to people of all ages in the developed and developing world to influencing decision makers who can help implement Sport for All ideas and programmes. The agenda of the Congress included plenary and interactive sessions that addressed the following:

- o Health benefits and risks of physical activity
 - o Modern ageing and needs for other specific population groups (e.g. people with disabilities, living in poverty) – a challenge for Sport for All
 - o Meeting developing countries' specific needs in Sport for All
 - o Sport for All as recreation and a form of social experience and cultural expression
 - o Designing strategies and directions for Sport for All
- UIPM Secretary General **Joël Bouzou** presented the abstract "World School Biathle – a Non-Expensive Sport Solution for Mass Participation and Fundamental Education" to the plenary session. UIPM Vice President **Juan Antonio Samaranch Jr** and UIPM Medical Committee Chair **Pr Fabio Pigozzi** were moderators.

The Congress in its final declaration stressed that for the sake of the youth of the world, it is time for urgent, real, targeted multi-sectoral action – in health, education and sport sectors at all levels and called on governments and public authorities, in consultation with NGOs and other organisations, to

- Develop national physical activity guidelines and targets
- Ensure the provision of community sport and recreation facilities, including accessible, clean open space
- Actively promote the need for personal physical activity through commitment, support and leadership
- Ensure increased provision of physical education
- Recognise that such actions are a good investment, significantly reducing public health costs and having major social benefits

Organised under the patronage of the IOC and the Sport for All Commission, the Congress also:

1. Called on National Olympic Committees (NOCs), International Federations (IFs) and other Olympic Movement organisations, working with education, health and sport authorities, NGOs and private sector organisations, and taking into account local factors and considerations, to:

Develop or expand at least one major Sport for All campaign each, taking into consideration local factors and needs, concentrating on the following:

- A community sport and recreation programme, in particular through clubs
- Education and public awareness, including promotion at all levels of sport, including major events, of the benefits of physical activity
- Support for facilities and clean open spaces for Sport For All
- Physical Education and promotion of healthy lifestyle in schools
- Ensuring such a campaign or programme is sustainable and

2. Encouraged NOCs, IFs and other Olympic Movement organisations to lobby and support governments and other organisations, particularly in developing countries to develop campaigns.

3. Asked NOCs, IFs and other Olympic Movement organisations to make as a deadline for the creation of such campaigns the 12th Sport for All Congress to be held in Malaysia in November 2008, with that Congress to hear, review and build on the results of those efforts, in particular in regard to the youth of the world.



UIPM

UIPM in Havana

In coordination with the Sport for All Congress, the Modern Pentathlon Federation of Cuba organised a special International Biathlon competition on 4 November in the Hemingway Bay, attended by Cuban NOC and Modern Pentathlon Federation President **José Fernandez Alvarez**, UIPM President **Klaus Schormann** and Vice President **Ivar Sisniega**, in which 340 athletes from 7 nations took part, including Ivar Sisniega who came 4th in his race. They discussed the next steps for the UIPM training academy in Havana (created in 2004) which will assist new nations in the Central America and Caribbean region. They also spoke about the organisation in the next years of a World Championships in Biathlon based on the excellent possibilities of Hemingway Bay.

In Havana, President Klaus Schormann met with **USOC** Chief of International Relations **Robert Fasulo** and discussed the close co-operation between UIPM and USOC to build a new strong team of USA Modern Pentathlon and the possibilities to organise again World Cups in the United States.

UIPM President in Germany

On 9 November, President Klaus Schormann visited the 'Computer-Medicine' Exhibition in Paderborn and also the 'Ahorn-Sportpark' which has been established by Heinz Nixdorf. The UIPM President met with Director Dr. Kurt Beiersdörfer and Curator

Michael Mikolajczak (HNF Heinz Nixdorf Museums Forum GmbH) and Willi Lenz, Director of Ahorn Sportpark GmbH, to discuss a project on **Computer and Sport** as an international exhibition (2008-2009) combined with international conferences and forums. The opening ceremony would be 19 December 2008 and President Klaus Schormann will act as coordinator between HNF Heinz Nixdorf Museums Forum GmbH and the international sports society.

UIPM Headquarters

IOC Sports Director Kelly Fairweather visited UIPM Headquarters on 9 November and discussed with Secretary General Joël Bouzou matters regarding Beijing 2008 Olympic Games.

Senior World Championships, Guatemala

The **Opening Ceremony** took place at the National Palace on 15 November and Speeches of welcome were given by **José Gandara Torrebiarte**, Minister of Sport, representing the President of Guatemala and **Willi Kaltschmitt**, IOC member, who gave also message wishing best success to the athletes from IOC President Jacques Rogge. President of the National MP Association and LOC, **Maria Isabel Luna de Sanz Agero**, informed the delegations that it had been an exciting year with a lot of work; a big challenge which gave great satisfaction. Also present at the Ceremony were **Sergio Castro**, President of the National Sports Confederation and **Fernando Beltranena Valladares**, President of the National Olympic Committee. UIPM President **Klaus Schormann** officially opened the World Championships. In his speech he confirmed that excellent facilities had been made available to the athletes for their training and for the competition; the message to the Olympic Family coming next year for the IOC Session and worldwide is that one can feel at home in Guatemala.

Attending the World Championships were the **President of the Republic Oscar Berger**, NOC President Fernando Beltranena Valladares, IOC member Willi Kaltschmitt, and **Mayor of Guatemala City Alvaro Arzu**, all of whom also took part in the award ceremonies. Together with the Embassy representatives who were also at the competition, the presence of such high level authorities was unprecedented in Championship history

Present at the Championships from UIPM were:- President Klaus Schormann, Secretary General Joël Bouzou, Vice Presidents John Helmick, Ivar Sisniega and Kui-Sung Choi, Sports Director Mauro Tirinnanzi, EB Member for Marketing Martin Dawe, Athletes' Committee Chair Stefano Giommoni and Confederation Presidents John Holland (NORCECA), José Rodriguez (South America) and Haeng-Soo Han (Asia).

The Women's Qualification competition was on 16 November and the Men's Qualification on the 17

November Over 150 athletes from 35 nations and all five continents, took part in the qualification events.

State President Oscar Berger gave a very special speech prior to the award ceremony of the Men's Final in which he thanked President of the National MP Association and LOC, Maria Isabel Luna de Sanz Agero, UIPM and its President Klaus Schormann and also in which he spoke about the importance of such competitions to promote Guatemala's capabilities in sport, tourism and culture. **City Mayor Arzu** made a similar speech on the occasion of the Men's Relay competition. President Klaus Schormann and State President Oscar Berger, following the Men's Final, discussed the excellent organisation of the World Championships and possibly for the future, competitions such as World Cup Finals, as well as special training sessions at the UIPM training academy in Guatemala City and the UIPM Congress being held in Antigua in 2008. President Berger underlined his support of UIPM, who had just promoted his country worldwide.

During the World Championships, President Klaus Schormann, Secretary General Joël Bouzou and Sport Director Mauro Tirinnanzi took part in a meeting of the **Pan American Confederation** on 18 November, chaired by Ivar Sisniega, during which they discussed future development in the region and the Pan American Games 2007.



Women's Final, 18 November

Egyptian athletes Omnia Fakhry (185 target points) and her younger team mate Aya Medany (184 target points) took the top two places in the Shoot. At the Fence, the competition was tight for first place between Kara Grant (CAN), Zsuzsanna Vörös (HUN) and Lena Schoneborn (GER) and it was the last few bouts that were the decider – the 2004 Olympic Champion won the discipline with 20 victories against 11 defeats. After 2 events, Zsuzsanna Vörös led with 2040 MP points, Tatiana Mouratova (RUS) in 2nd with 1980 MP points. Polina Strutchkova (RUS) was the fastest pentathlete in the pool, winning the 200m freestyle in 2:09.05, but only half a second ahead of Viktoria Tereschuk (UKR). There was no change at the top after 3 events, Zsuzsanna Vörös with 3300 MP points ahead of Tatiana Mouratova at 3248 MP points and Omnia Fakhry in 3rd. However, changes at the top did take place after the Ride, where 5 athletes had perfect scores with a sixth completing the course in a clear round with a time penalty. It was an exciting run as after 4 events, Omnia Fakhry and Marta Dziadura (POL) were tied at the top and started the run together. Elena Rublevska (LAT) took off 15 seconds later. Round the first two laps, **Marta Dziadura** kept the lead with Omnia Fakhry just behind, but by the end of the last lap, following Dziadura across the finish line was **Viktoria Tereschuk** (UKR) who had started out in 20th place

and 1 minute 13 behind Dziadura. The Silver medalist also ran the 3000m course in the fastest time 10 minutes and 20 seconds. **Omnia Fakhry** was able to hold onto 3rd place which gave Africa its first ever Senior World Championships medal. Team Gold went to Poland, Great Britain won the Silver and Hungary took Bronze.

Men's Final, 19 November

Marcin Horbacz (POL) and Sergiy Kukshin (UKR) tied for first in the Shoot with 187 target points (1180 MP points) in a high level competition in which nearly two thirds of the competitors scored over 1100 MP points. Edvinas Krungolcas (LTU) came first in the Fence event with 21 victories against 10 defeats, the Egyptians Mena Tadros and Amro El Geziry together with 2004 Olympic Champion Andrei Moiseev (RUS) were in 2nd with one less victory. Amro El Geziry won the Swim with a time of 1:56.31 for 1408 MP points a second fastest than Andrei Moiseev. Edvinas Krungolcas led with 3424 MP points after 3 events, Viktor Horvath (HUN) was in 2nd place with 3368 MP points. In the Ride, only 3 athletes received perfect scores and Edvinas Krungolcas' lead at the top of the table shrunk after 4 events, his handicap reduced to 7 seconds ahead of Viktor Horvath. **Edvinas Krungolcas** claimed his first World Championship medal with an unthreatened 3000m run straight across the finish line for Gold, followed by **Viktor Horvath** in 2nd place for Silver. The battle for Bronze was won by **Andrejus Zadneprovskis** (LTU) ahead of Libor Capalini (CZE). Illia Frolov (RUS) was the fastest runner completing the cross country course in 9 minutes and 40 seconds. Team Gold went to Lithuania, Silver to Hungary and Bronze to Czech Republic.

Women's Relay, 20 November

13 teams from four continents participated - Belarus, Brazil, Canada, China, Great Britain, Guatemala, Hungary, Italy, Kazakhstan, Mexico, Poland, Russia and USA. BELARUS won the shoot with 270 target points (1144 MP points), 2 target points ahead of the CHINA (1120 MP points). The Fence was won jointly by RUSSIA and POLAND 72 victories against 36 defeats, only one victory more than GREAT BRITAIN who were leading up until the last round. After 2 events, POLAND took the lead ahead of Belarus. Thanks to the fastest 3x100m swim from the Russian girls (3 minutes 5 seconds), RUSSIA shot to the top of the table after 3 events with a total of 3264 MP points. CHINA had the second fastest swim, 5 seconds slower than the Russians, which put them joint 2nd with GREAT BRITAIN. A windy afternoon at the Ride, nearly all the teams had very good rounds, POLAND the only team to achieve the perfect 1200 MP points. RUSSIA still had first place in the table after 4 events and started the 3x1500m run 16 seconds ahead of POLAND, themselves only 7 seconds ahead of GREAT BRITAIN. **POLAND** (Boenisz) overtook RUSSIA (Sirotkina) before the

first changeover and the order remained the same until the last lap when **GREAT BRITAIN** (Harland) overtook **RUSSIA** (Mouratova) some few hundred metres before the finish line. Poland received its 3rd Gold of the Championships following the Individual and Team Gold of two days ago in the Women's Final. Great Britain also showed good teamwork with its 2nd team Silver medal of the Championships.

Men's Relay, 21 November

Full complement of 16 teams participated: - Belarus, Brazil, China, Czech Republic, Egypt, France, Germany, Great Britain, Guatemala, Hungary, Italy, Korea, Lithuania, Mexico, Russia and USA. HUNGARY led after 2 events, having come 2nd in the Shoot with 1216 MP points (276 target points) and won the Fence with 79 Victories against 56 defeats (808 MP points). The Shoot was actually won by GERMANY by just one target point. GREAT BRITAIN was the fastest swim team by two seconds in the 3x100m Relay with a time of 2:44.23 compared to RUSSIA's 2:46.40. HUNGARY led the table still after 3 events with 3280 MP points ahead of BELARUS with 3248 MP points. Another blustery day at the Ride/Run venue, but it did not stop a third of the teams achieving perfect rounds of 1200 MP points, including the top teams, so that the start order for the run remained unchanged with **HUNGARY** starting 8 seconds ahead of **BELARUS**. It was a straight run for both the teams to Gold and Silver medal places on the podium, as well as for **CHINA**, who took Bronze – their first ever team relay medal in a Senior World Championships.

Committees

***Technical Committee**

The UIPM Technical Committee, chaired by Sports Director Mauro Tirinnanzi, met in Antigua, Guatemala, on 22-23 November, following the World Senior Championships. President Klaus Schormann, Secretary General Joël Bouzou and Athletes' Committee Chair Stefano Giommoni were guests at the meeting. Items on the agenda included:- reports of the TC members on 2006, new competition formats, competition rules, International calendar, Pentathlon World Ranking, Seminars for Judges, Coaches & Organisers, appointment of Technical Delegates, International Judges and National Observers for 2007 season, and International Licenses. The next meeting of the Technical Committee will be in March 2007.

Continental Confederations

***Asia**

The **2006 AMPBC Congress** was held on 10 November in Kaohsiung, Chinese Taipei, on the occasion of the Asian MP Championships. 6 member nations attended the Congress (China, Japan, Kazakhstan, Korea, Kyrgyzstan, Chinese Taipei). All the attendees watched the DVDs of 2006 and 2005 Biathle & Shooting Competition held in Chiba, Japan. Mr. Mehmet Sait Yakut, Vice President of Balkan MP Union and President of Turkey MP Federation who was attending 2006 Asian Championships and AMPBC Congress as an observer, showed much interest in the format and said he would show the DVDs to the Balkan states. 2007 Asian Congress and Asia/Oceania Qualifying Competition for Beijing Olympic Games programme was decided as follows in Tokyo, Japan :-

8 May (Tue)-Arrival

9 May (Wed)-Jumping Test & Opening Ceremony

10 May (Thu)-Individual Men

11 May (Fri)-Individual Women

12 May (Sat)-Relay Men & AMPBC Congress

13 May (Sun)-Relay Women & Awarding/Closing Ceremony

14 May (Mon)-Departure
